

Lied Public Library FY15

Thank you for allowing me to present this annual report on behalf of the Lied Public Library Board of Trustees.

The Lied Public Library of Clarinda has been “building our community” for more than 108 years. The library not only offers numerous books, movies, downloadable collections and countless other resources it also plays a vital role in the personal stories of each and every citizen.

Your library is open 6 days a week, 48 hours a week. We’re open 24/7 at clarindapubliclibrary.org. It’s convenient that in this day and age you no longer have to come to the library to use it — though many people still do. Almost 49,000 people visited the library to borrow, learn, meet together, work and relax. The library transforms children’s lives and our children’s area is a testament to it as well as our goal to foster early literacy. Attractions like the LeapPads, educational toys and friendly staff ensure family visits spark a desire in kids to return again and again.

Why is the library valuable? Ask the 6,284 folks who are card-carrying members. We serve people from all walks of life so the value they get from using their card varies — from learning a new computer skill to finding the perfect bedtime story for their kids.

I’d like to thank the community for the support given to the library, both past and present, as well as the Friends of the Lied Public Library and Clarinda (Lied) Public Library Foundation. This also includes the countless number of volunteers who have donated over 1,050 hours to the library in FY15. Without their help and support the library would be unable to provide such great service.

In an average week during FY15, the Lied Public Library...

- Welcomed 925 visitors
- Circulated over 1,576 items (nearly 262 per day)
- Answered over 48 questions
- Provided computer use to nearly 191 customers
- Added 69 items to the Library’s collection
- Issued 8 new borrower’s cards
- Received 956 hits on the Library’s website
- Processed 22 requests from customers and libraries for interlibrary loan materials





Highlights of FY15



July: The library's popular Summer Library Programs continued into July with Bubble Fun, Mad Science of Iowa, Colorful Chemistry, Paper Air Planes, Forensic Science, and many others. Over the Summer, 2,354 people attended 62 free programs offered at the library and children turned in 775 reading logs!

August: The library began offering monthly computer classes which have included a very popular Windows 8 class. These were in addition to the library's monthly one-on-one help and iPad Club. The Friends of the Library held their semi-annual used book sale. The library also hosted a display from the Nodaway Valley Historical Museum in our display case on early schools in Clarinda. Thanks to a grant from the Clarinda Foundation, a new ceiling mounted projector was installed in the library's meeting room.

September: The library hosted a Star Gazing event at the library and Runza held their annual "Great Books for Great Kids" fundraiser in which a percentage of their daily sales was donated to the library.



October: The library celebrated 10 years at our current location with a lot of fun events. Community members helped decorate a banner for the library and visitors to the library received a gift. IPTV's Dan Kaercher spoke at the library about "Exploring the Great Midwest." Patrons also received free replacement library cards along with free printing and no fines. Additionally, the library held an open house to the community and hosted Susan Steinhoff and the Bethesda Recorder Consort. The events were capped off with the library's annual Fall Festival which drew over 500 people to the library for crafts, games and a magic show performed by Ken Cooper.

November: Library staff completed a project converting the library's collection of local history and programs from VHS to DVD. Over 100 videos were digitized. The library continued to host LEGO Club twice a month. The Friends of the Library graciously decorated the library for the holidays.



December : The library hosted its annual holiday concert with a selection of holiday music played by the Bethesda Recorder Consort. Teen Advisory Board members created holiday tree decorations out of old books.

January: The library hosted a special program with author Lauraine Snelling via Skype. Lauraine is the award-winning author of more than 80 books with sales of over 2 million copies. The library also hosted a Legislative Briefing and Page County Public Health provided free blood pressure screening.

February: The Library expanded its free digital magazine service, Zinio, by adding more titles and partnering with other area libraries. Users now have access to over 150 titles with their library card. The annual magazine giveaway was held on the 9th, which helps make room for the next year's magazines.



March: The library held a Strategy Game Night which challenged participants to the game Settlers of Catan. A Blind Date with a Book was also hosted which allowed users to choose a mystery book to take home on a date. They then got to rate their date and those who rated their date, the library selected two winners who received a box of chocolates. A special Quilt Trunk show was also held which had over 50 people attend. Library Director Andrew Hoppmann attended a meeting in Des Moines with local legislators to talk about libraries and their role in Iowa.




April: National Library Week took place between April 13-20 and the library celebrated by handing out free replacement cards, hosting a special volunteer recognition event, waiving fines for patrons and holding a drawing for the Golden Library Card, a special card that enables the bearer to have their fines waived for life! The library also hosted Bill Jamerson who presented a program on the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) called Dollar-A-Day Boys.



May: Thanks to a grant from the Page County Community Foundation the library was able to install a Self-Check user station, wireless public printer, and new technology in the large study room. A traveling exhibit on the History of the Book was also displayed.

June: The library kicked off another summer full of programs with Gary Weldon who gave a puppet show for all ages. The library also had special guests which included: Clarinda Police Chief Keith Brothers, Science Center of Iowa, Yoga with Jessica Hoppmann, Life Net Air Medical Services, Council Bluffs Recycling Center, Superhero Science, ISU Extension, Omaha Henry Doorly Zoo and Blank Park Zoo. The library hosted Janet Neihart as well, who gave a program on their travels and touring company.







